The Ascension of Our Lord

Derived from the ancient monastic evening offices of Vespers and Compline, Evensong (literally "Evening Song") is an almost entirely sung service. Thomas Cranmer, the first Anglican Archbishop of Canterbury, combined the above two monastic offices into one Anglican lay office, characterized by the chanting of psalms and the singing of the principal canticles from each – the Magnificat from Vespers and the Nunc dimittis from Compline. This felicitous pairing, and the mystical atmosphere of a church at dusk, have fired the imaginations of many of the Anglican Church's greatest musicians. Please note that the texts to some of the sung items may differ slightly from what is printed in the modern Book of Common Prayer, particularly the Preces and Suffrages.

The First Lesson

The Communion of the People

The Episcopal Church invites all the baptized to the Lord's Table. Come forward by the center aisle, return to your seat by the side aisles. To receive the consecrated Bread, extend your hands, palms upward and crossed. We have gluten-free wafers; please tell the priest if you need one. When receiving the Wine, please assist the chalice as it is offered; or, having consumed the Bread, return to your seat. We believe Christ to be fully present in either Element. If you prefer not to receive the Sacrament, you may remain seated, or you may come forward and ask for a Blessing by crossing your arms over your breast. After returning to your seat you may sit, kneel or stand.
